For the Special Attention of Parents

We value strong communication between school and home, and we thank you for your continued support. To help maintain clarity, professionalism, and mutual respect in all interactions, we kindly remind all parents of the following:

- Appointments with Staff: Visiting the school without a scheduled appointment is not permitted. All appointments must be arranged through **Ms Ghada**, who will liaise with the appropriate staff member to confirm a suitable time.
- **Email Communication**: All email correspondence with the school must come directly from a parent or guardian's email account. Emails sent from student accounts will not be actioned.
- Respectful Conduct: The school will not accept or respond to any inflammatory or inappropriate comments made via email or during scheduled meetings. We are committed to maintaining a respectful and constructive dialogue at all times.
- Mobile Phones: Mobile phones are strictly banned in school. Students must not bring phones onto campus under any circumstances. Any phones found will be confiscated and returned only in line with school policy.
- Social Media: The English Academy does not respond to any concerns or disputes
 raised via social media. Any issues relating to social media activity must be directed
 to the appropriate Kuwaiti authorities.
- Class and Form Groups: Student class sets and form classes are created by the school after careful academic and pastoral consideration. These decisions are final and will not be discussed or altered at parental request.
- School Appearance: We ask all parents to carefully review the school's
 expectations regarding student appearance, particularly in relation to boys'
 hairstyles and the wearing of non-permitted items. Students must arrive each day
 in full compliance with the school's uniform and appearance policy.
- Lanyards: To promote safeguarding within the school it is mandatory that all staff and students wear their school Lanyard. This is part of the uniform and needs to be worn at all times.
- Behaviour and Sanctions: The English Academy follows a clear, fair, and
 consistent behaviour policy. Any behaviour deemed unacceptable within the
 school is managed according to this policy. All sanctions applied by the school are
 in line with this framework and are not subject to parental negotiation or
 revision.

TEA Talons & Our Houses

All students in The English Academy are part of a TEAM TEA TALONS. We have four House Teams within the school, they are called - Eagles/Falcons/Hawks/Owls. They each have their own open logo and colour and all students belong to one House. Throughout the year 'House Points' are given to students for various academic, sporting and positive contributions to school life. The totals are displayed and each team competes against each other - with prizes and barbecues for the termly winners!









Tutor Groups & Year Groups

Each student belongs to a tutor group. The tutor groups cover all abilities and they sometimes are created based on subjects choices or pastoral requirements. You will have your own Tutor Group and Form Tutor - example 7G, 8Y, 10R etc. There is no movement between these groups throughout the year.

The Form Groups are part of the Year Group - which has a Year Group Leader to manage and support all of the students in that year. If you need support you will speak to your Form Tutor and if necessary your Year Group Leader.

The Role of the Student Council

The Student Council at The English Academy plays an important role in giving students a voice and helping to shape the life of the school. Through the Council, students are encouraged to share their ideas, raise issues, and work collaboratively to support improvements across the school community. Each Tutor Group and Year Group elects representatives through annual elections, ensuring that every student has a voice in decision-making and school development.

The Student Council also plays an active role in organising and managing school events throughout the year and is empowered to develop new initiatives that enhance school life. Being part of the Student Council helps students develop leadership, communication, and teamwork skills, while promoting a sense of ownership and pride in their school. It reflects our belief that every student can make a meaningful contribution and that their opinions are valued and respected.

Starting the Day

It is vital you attend school on time and make a positive start to the day. Registration is always first with your Form Group and Form Tutor. This is vital for messages and updates for the school day and week. The Registration is how you are marked present for the morning.



Always spend some time the previous evening checking that you have all your equipment and books for the next day's lessons. This also helps make a positive start to the day!

Moving between Lessons

The school has three floors, a roof area and a basement. These are shared between all of the students and staff in the school. Safety moving around the school is paramount. We require students to move in single file, in an orderly, quiet fashion when moving between lessons and breaks. To keep the corridors moving - students must move on the left.

Effective Use of Student Breaks

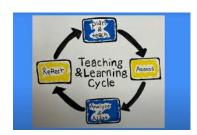

Teaching and Learning at The English Academy

Our approach emphasises the development of metacognitive skills, helping students to reflect on their own thinking, set goals, and plan effective strategies for learning. Enquiry-based learning lies at the heart of our teaching philosophy. Students are encouraged to ask questions, investigate topics, and apply their knowledge in meaningful ways, fostering curiosity, critical thinking, and creativity. In addition, we integrate the effective use of digital learning tools to enhance teaching and learning across all subjects. Through the use of Chromebooks, educational apps, and online platforms, students develop essential digital literacy skills that will prepare them for the demands of the modern world.

Our teaching and learning practices are designed to support not only academic excellence but also the development of confident, reflective, and resilient learners who are prepared to meet the challenges of the future.

The Learning Week

Each student will follow a timetable of lessons in every school week. We divide our school year into three terms. With a half-term break, termly breaks and Ramadan hours in a school year. A student register is taken at the beginning of every lesson to promote punctuality and positive behaviour for learning.

Class and Teacher Allocations

At The English Academy, great care is taken when allocating teachers to class groups. Staff assignments are based on their subject expertise, teaching style, and the specific needs of each year group or set. Our aim is to maximise teaching effectiveness and ensure the highest possible outcomes for all students. For this reason, **form classes, subject teachers, and sets are not changed during the school year**. This consistency allows teachers to build strong relationships with students, maintain continuity in learning, and deliver carefully planned progression across the academic year. We appreciate parental understanding and support in upholding this approach.

Assessment and Measuring Progress

At The English Academy, assessment is an integral part of supporting student learning and ensuring continuous improvement. Through a combination of formal assessments, classwork, and teacher feedback, we monitor each student's progress carefully and regularly. Students are guided to understand their own strengths and areas for development, and are encouraged to set SMART targets—Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time-bound—to help them make clear and purposeful improvements.

By using assessment not just as a judgement, but as a tool for growth, we empower students to take ownership of their learning and to strive towards personal excellence. We use external academic measurement tools to collect information on student ability, strengths and areas of challenge. Throughout the year feedback and progress is at the heart of our learning & teaching cycle. There are defined as:



Formative Assessment: This is an ongoing process where teachers provide regular feedback to help students improve their understanding and skills. Formative assessments may include classwork, quizzes, presentations, and peer or self-assessments. The focus is on growth and learning rather than grades.

Summative Assessment: These are periodic evaluations designed to measure student achievement at the end of a unit or term. Summative assessments may include written tests, projects, or practical assignments. These assessments contribute to the overall grading for each subject.

- At the beginning of Term 1 Year 7 will undertake baseline assessments to support teachers and students in highlighting strengths and areas of challenge in Maths, English and Science.
- We also use external diagnostic assessments to gauge verbal, mathematical and quantitative capabilities.

Responsible Use of Al Tools

At The English Academy, we recognise the growing presence of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in education and beyond. While AI tools such as ChatGPT or Google Bard can support learning when used appropriately, students must understand that using AI to complete assignments, assessments, or coursework on their behalf is considered academic dishonesty. All work submitted must reflect your own understanding, effort, and voice. Misuse of AI—including copying answers or using AI-generated content without proper acknowledgement—will be treated as a serious breach of our academic integrity policy. We are committed to helping students learn how to use these tools responsibly and ethically, but misuse will carry consequences. If in doubt, always ask your teacher.

Reporting for Students & Parents

- **Termly Progress Reviews:** In each term, students will complete end of term assessments to measure progress in previous learning. These are produced as School reports and provide students, staff and parents with key information.
- In addition to Academic progress the reports include information on attendance, punctuality, behaviour and effort throughout the term.
- Our Parent Consultation sessions provide parents with the opportunity to discuss any
 of these issues with their child teachers.

The Importance of Parental Communication

At The English Academy, we believe that strong communication between school and home is essential for student success. We value the partnership we have with parents and recognise that regular, open communication helps to build trust, reinforce expectations, and support each child's development.

Communicate With Parents

By keeping parents informed about academic progress, behaviour, and school life, we ensure that students receive consistent guidance and encouragement both at school and at home. We encourage parents to stay actively engaged with the school community and to work with us to support their child's learning journey.

Complaints Process for Parents

At The English Academy, we are committed to working in partnership with parents to ensure the best possible experience for every student. If concerns arise, we encourage parents to communicate with us promptly so that issues can be addressed in a timely, respectful, and constructive manner. All emails to the school must come from a parent email and not the student account. We aim to resolve complaints at the earliest stage possible and follow a clear process to ensure fairness and transparency. We do not accept or respond to emails that are derogatory or threatening.

Steps in the Complaints Process:

- **Email Communication** All initial complaints must be made by email to the Secondary School Secretary, Ms Ghada, at **ght@tea.edu.kw**.
- The complaint will be directed to the appropriate staff member, such as the relevant teacher, Head of Department, or Year Leader, depending on the nature of the concern.
- If the issue remains unresolved, it will be escalated to a member of the Senior Leadership Team.
- If necessary, a formal meeting or written complaint may be arranged involving the Principal.
- A full and fair investigation will be carried out, and parents will be informed of the outcome and any actions taken.

We kindly remind all parents that **visiting the school to speak with staff without a prior appointment is not permitted**. All appointments must be arranged through Ms Ghada, who will coordinate with the appropriate staff member. This ensures that time is used effectively and that all concerns are addressed in a respectful and professional manner.

Behaviour for Learning - Positive Expectations

Uniform

All students are expected to wear correct and smart school uniform at all times when in school, or when representing the school in any way.

The uniform code below applies to all students in Years 7-11.

Summer Uniform

- Light blue collared shirt with school badge:
 - o if long sleeved, the sleeves must be rolled down and buttoned
 - o the top button of the shirt must be done up at all times
 - o boys must tuck in their shirt at all times
 - o girls should not tuck in their shirts
- School tie
- Dark blue TEA tailored trousers. Trousers must fit appropriately
- A simple belt with discreet buckle
- Plain white or dark socks
- Classic black shoes with or without laces [no trainers or shoes that 'look' like trainers]

Winter Uniform

- This is as the summer uniform
- In addition a camel coloured blazer with a school badge must be worn. The blazer must be worn at all times except in lessons when permission is given to remove it
- If students wish to wear an additional layer under the blazer, a school jumper may be worn – not a school PE sweatshirt
- A sensible outdoor coat may be worn if the weather is poor

P.E. Kit

All your uniform and P.E. kit items must be clearly marked with your name.

- PE TEA shorts and t-shirt
- House colour t-shirt with school emblem for inter-house competitions
- White sports socks
- Training shoes
- Blue tracksuit with school emblem for winter use

Additional Uniform Code

- All students MUST have a school Lab coat. This can be purchased from the school uniform shop.
- Girls with pierced ears may wear one set of simple stud earrings only no other piercings are allowed.
- Girls are not allowed to wear make-up of any kind (including nail varnish and hair colour)
- All students may wear a wristwatch, no smartwatches allowed
- No other forms of jewellery are allowed
- Baseball caps and other hats are not allowed (cont.d)

General Appearance

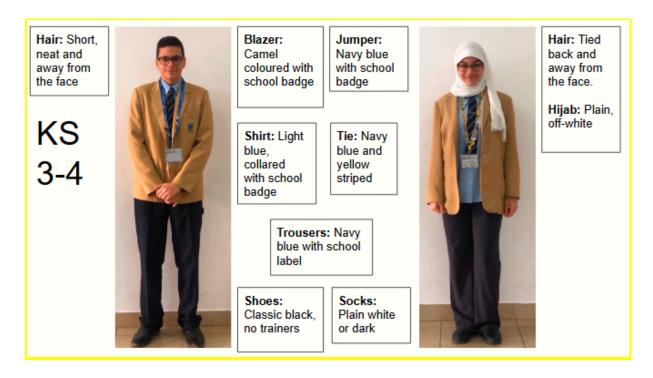
Students at The English Academy are expected to take pride in their appearance and therefore should be neat and tidy at all times.

BOYS

- o hair should be short, neat and away from the face.
- o avoid haircuts that result in a shaved line and/or significant difference in length.
- o Facial hair should be neatly styled to give a clean-cut appearance.

• GIRLS

- Girls' hair should be neat, tied back and kept away from the face at all times.
 For practical lessons, it should be tied back completely. Hair gel/wax must not be used excessively.
- Girls who wear Hijab can wear white or off-white hijabs with the same coloured band underneath.
- Girls can wear plain coloured white, blue or black simple headbands, no bandana or character ears.



PE uniform to be worn on PE days only.

For any after school training or practice, please change to PE uniform after school only.

Attendance and Punctuality

Students are expected to arrive in school by 7.20 am. Students who arrive late after 7.45 a.m will be marked as 'late' and must go to the Secretary at gate 1 so they can be marked in the register. It is extremely important to start your day on time so you can have a calm start to the day.



Parents of students who are repeatedly late can expect to be invited into school to discuss the problem of lateness.

If a student is going to be absent for a few days because of sickness or for family reasons, the school should be informed via telephone/ email. Upon return to school, students who are absent from school because of sickness are expected to have a medical note which can either be given to the form tutor or The Secondary Secretary Ms Ghada.

Equipment to support Learning

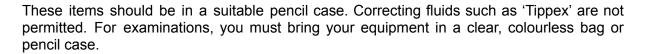
You will need to provide a range of suitable equipment to allow you to participate effectively in all lessons.

Celebrating Student Achievement

- Commitment to school sports and other activities beyond the school day.

House Assemblies Celebrations

House Assemblies are an important part of school life at The English Academy. They provide a valuable opportunity to celebrate student achievements, reinforce shared values, and strengthen House identity and spirit. During these assemblies, students are recognised for their effort, progress, and contributions to school life through the awarding of certificates and other forms of praise. These



celebrations promote a sense of belonging, motivation, and pride across the student body.

House Termly Barbecues

To encourage healthy competition and reward positive contributions, The English Academy tracks House Points throughout the term. Whole School Assemblies

Twice a week, The English Academy gathers for whole school assemblies that bring our community together to celebrate success, share key messages, and reinforce the school's values. Sanctions

Our aim is not only to correct the behaviour but also to help students understand its impact, take responsibility, and make better choices in the future. Through consistent expectations and compassionate guidance, we support every student in developing the self-discipline and integrity needed to thrive within the school community and beyond.

We use a colour coded scale system to sanction behaviour that is not in alignment with our student values. They correspond to different levels of unacceptable behaviour dependent on the nature of the incident in which a student is involved. Involvement in unacceptable behaviour will mean a sanction against those student(s) involved.

LEVEL 1 WHITE:

Students may be issued with a WHITE referral slip for the following:

- Littering, Chewing gum, behaviour not supporting learning
- Lateness to class, Lack of books/equipment/PE kit/planner/Chromebook
- Incorrect uniform including jewellery, hair and nail varnish
- In classroom/changing room/lab unsupervised
- Not speaking in English, other than in Arabic, Islamic or French lessons
- No homework 2nd time
- Using any unauthorised equipment in school, including electronic games, toys and balls.
- Failure to bring Chromebook charged
- Not listening or talking whilst a teacher is talking, Failure to start classwork promptly,
 Not following basic instructions

The consequence for a white referral is a break detention.



LEVEL 2 YELLOW:

Students may be issued with a YELLOW negative referral slip for the following:

- Further breach of level 1 incident
- Significant poor behaviour such as Swearing, Spitting or 'Play fighting'
- Having a mobile phone anywhere within school during the school day
- Malpractice during assessments or examinations
- Copying another student's work. Plagiarism
- Being deliberately obstructive, defiant or non-compliant of instructions.
- Misuse of Chromebook
- Not attending lessons when present in school

The consequence for a yellow referral is school detention or report

LEVEL 3 ORANGE:

Students may be issued with an ORANGE negative referral slip for the following:

- Second breach of the same level 2 incident
- Deliberately damaging property of school of fellow students
- Using foul, racist or sexual language
- Fighting, retaliating or bullying
- Being disrespectful to any member of staff or the public
- Leaving class or school without permission
- Bringing anything dangerous or illegal to school/or using smoking materials
- Failure to attend detention
- Unsanctioned recordings, photography and/or filming at school
- Distribution or transmission of any recording, photographs and filming on social media

The consequence for an orange referral is a external suspension for 1-5 days

Student Re-Registration

At The English Academy, re-registration for the following academic year is not automatic. It is based on a student's overall conduct, academic performance, attendance, and commitment to the school's values. The school expects all students to demonstrate respectful behaviour, maintain strong attendance and punctuality, apply consistent effort in their studies, and contribute positively to the school community. Re-registration is therefore subject to review and is at the full discretion of the school's leadership team. Parents will be informed in advance if there are concerns that may impact re-registration.
